#### The Education People

#### Education Safeguarding Service (ESS)

#### **End of Term Preparation**

As you approach the end of the academic year for 2020-21 you should ensure that you are confident you are supporting children with additional safeguarding/welfare concerns over the summer holidays and beyond. Additionally, for children who are transferring from your setting to another, you need to ensure that you have done all you can to make that transition as smooth as possible.



Now is a good time for Safeguarding Leads and their teams to review the children and young people they have had concerns about over recent months:

- Have you liaised with their parents/carers or other professionals where appropriate?
- Have you considered all the information you hold holistically, considering all concerns, risks and all protective factors?
- What is your analysis of need; are there supports that need to be put in place for the duration of the break, have you spoken with the child/young person and heard their views wishes and any worries they may have?
- Are there <u>services</u> you can refer the family to such as foodbanks, Citizens advice and similar local charities if they have financial worries.
- Does the parent need to know about services to protect and support where alcohol or domestic abuse is involved?
- Are they aware of services such as the Samaritans or other listening services for those who are experiencing poor mental health or emotional wellbeing?

#### Keeping Children Safe in Education 2021

#### Keeping Children Safe in Education 2021 Now Available

The draft 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' (KCSIE) guidance was postponed temporarily due to the Ofsted Review of sexual abuse in schools and colleges but has now (6.7.21) been published <u>for September 2021</u>. Annex G contains a list of substantive changes.

Keeping children safe in education 2021

The DfE have also updated the '<u>Sexual violence and sexual</u> harassment between children in schools and colleges' quidance.

We recommend DSLs and school/college leaders read KCSIE 2021 in its entirety, however a summary of key changes are:

- Extensive updates and increased content relating to peer on peer abuse throughout part one, two and five. Including:
  - An emphasis that victims should be taken seriously, kept safe and never be made to feel like they are creating a problem for reporting abuse, sexual violence or sexual harassment.
  - Updated references to the UKCIS guidance on the sharing of nude and semi-nude images.
  - Part two contain additional content regarding reporting systems and information schools and colleges should include in their child protection policy.
  - Part five contains clarification about regularly reviewing actions e.g. for patterns of inappropriate behaviour and bail considerations, and a new section on unsubstantiated, unfounded, false or malicious reports
- Updated content in part one relating to mental health, serious violence, contextual safeguarding and record keeping.
- New content in part two relating to a 'Whole school and college approach to safeguarding'.
- New paragraphs in part two regarding online safety training for staff and the requirement to ensure children are taught about safeguarding, including online safety.
- Part two contains a new section covering online safety, remote learning, filters and monitoring, information security, cybercrime, reviewing online safety provision and information and support.
- Part three has been substantively restructured to align it with the recruitment process, however legal duties have not changed.
- Part four has been separated into two sections Section one for allegations that may meet the threshold and Section Two for allegations/concerns that do not meet the threshold i.e. low level concerns.
- There is now a condensed 'Part one' of KCSIE available as 'Annex A' which can be provided to staff who do not directly work with children, if the governing body or proprietor think it is appropriate.
- Annex B has been updated with additional content regarding Child Criminal Exploitation, Child Sexual Exploitation, Modern Slavery and the National Referral Mechanism, County lines, Cybercrime, Peer on Peer abuse and preventing radicalisation.
- Annex C contains additional information for DSLs about keeping and storing records, where a concern about a child has been identified.
- The content from the 2020 annex C 'Online Safety' has been integrated throughout the document to ensure online safety is clearly established as part of schools and colleges safeguarding responsibilities. Annex D now provides signposting to resources.

#### ESS Policy Templates and DSL Training Pack Updates

Due to the late release of KCSIE 2021, we are now starting to review and update our policy templates and guidance for 2021. We anticipate this work will take place throughout July and early August and updated documents will be published on the Education People website as soon as possible.

#### Covid-19 Advice and Support

Whisper it quietly but we may be getting back to life which resembles normality. However, the lasting effects of Covid-19 will be felt professionally and personally for many of us for some considerable time. We know many schools have opened up more, but others are waiting for September term to try and get back to normal. Some schools have learnt some useful lessons from using bubbles and are considering keeping it in some form going forward.

Even though many schools have now re-opened fully some families may still be reluctant to return their children to school or their attendance will remain poor. Some children continue to state that they are anxious about Covid-19 and with the concern about the Delta variant and delay to re-opening it can be hard to convince them otherwise. In terms of whether matters need to be escalated it would be useful in these situations to consider completing the <a href="Safeguarding Toolkit">Safeguarding Toolkit</a> to help you decide. Also have a discussion with your attendance and inclusion team about whether you need to get tougher around attendance and what would satisfy you that parents and some young people have made efforts to try and address their anxiety and related emotional wellbeing.

#### Ofsted Review of Sexual Abuse in Schools & Updated Handbooks

#### Review of Sexual Abuse in Schools

In June, Ofsted published a review into sexual abuse in schools. The review comprised: 32 visits to schools and colleges; the experience of 900 children and young people;



Consultation with leaders, teachers, governors, Local Safeguarding Partnerships, parents and stakeholders, the extent to which inspection has given oversight and the role of statutory guidance. The focus of the review focused on the areas of safeguarding and curriculum, multi-agency safeguarding arrangements and victims' voice and reporting. As we wrote in the last newsletter whilst the behaviour described by those interviewed could be considered a societal problem, there are clearly areas where education settings need to improve their processes and responses. It is likely that more guidance will be forthcoming over the summer.

#### <u>Updated Ofsted Inspection Handbooks</u>

On the 28<sup>th</sup> June, Ofsted <u>published updated Inspection handbooks</u> clarifying how inspectors will assess how schools and colleges confront sexual harassment, abuse and violence among children and young people. These changes will take place in inspections in schools/colleges from <u>September 2021</u> and include:

- Inspectors will expect leaders to assume that sexual harassment, online sexual abuse and sexual violence are happening in and around their school, even when there are no specific reports, and to have put in place a whole-school approach to address them.
- Inspectors will consider how schools/colleges handle allegations and incidents of sexual abuse between children and young people when they do occur.
- Inspectors will look at the preventative measures in place to guard against sexual harassment and abuse, including behaviour policies, pastoral support and the relationships, sex and health education (RSHE) curriculum.
- Ofsted will expect schools/colleges to be alert to factors that increase children's potential vulnerability to sexual abuse, and to understand and address the barriers that could prevent a child or young person from reporting an incident.
- Where schools/colleges do have not adequate processes in place, it is likely that safeguarding will be considered ineffective. This can impact on the 'leadership and management' judgement and the overall grade is likely to be 'inadequate'.

We encourage DSLs to work with their leadership team to review existing safeguarding policies and procedures and curriculum approaches and implement any necessary changes. DSLs should consider what evidence exists to document action already taken to ensure there are whole-school approaches regarding preventing and responding to peer on peer abuse, including sexual violence and harassment.

The <u>Early Years handbook</u> has also been updated to reflect changes implemented as a result of Covid-19 and also the implementation of the EYFS from September 2021. The handbook states that where the expectations in the 'Inspecting safeguarding in the early years, education and skills settings' differ from those set out in the EYFS, settings should follow the EYFS requirements. DSLs in early years settings should therefore read these documents and ensure they are familiar with the welfare requirements from September 2021.

#### Updates and Resources

#### 'Introduction to the Front Door Service'

The Front Door Service is the first point of contact for professionals and the public who are concerned about a child in Kent and process all safeguarding referrals (Requests for Support) made to Kent Children's Social Work Services.



The Front Door Team are offering partner agencies the opportunity to learn more about their service by inviting staff to attend an 'Introduction to the Front Door Service' presentation. These sessions will be held on the first Friday of each month and last for approx. one hour, starting at 1pm. Future dates are:

#### **Directory of Services**

#### The Education People: Wellbeing Toolkit for Parents



The Education People have continued to extend our mental health and wellbeing support for education professionals by setting up a national and international network for mental health leads. In addition to this our mental health and wellbeing consultant,

Kelly Hannaghan, has also launched a <u>wellbeing toolkit for parents</u>. This is a series of four webinars delivered by two experts in the field of wellbeing and anxiety. There is a specific webinar that focuses on how to support children with autism around their possible increased levels of anxiety. Parents and carers will receive practical strategies and solutions to the issues that they may currently be experiencing. The cost is £20.

#### Saving Lives Innovation Fund now open



The latest Saving Lives Innovation Fund is now open on the <u>KCC Website</u>. This is the 4<sup>th</sup> round of funding which is designed to fund new or emerging community level programmes across Kent & Medway. There is at least £250,000 available, of which a minimum of £50,000 must go to projects supporting children and young people. #### Early Years and Childcare

#### Risk by Association Question

It has come to our attention that some early years settings including nurseries, pre-schools and foundation stage schools may still be asking potential new staff about declaring risk by association issues.



The guidance was updated back on the 31st of August 2018 and came into force on 3rd September 2018. A change in the law means that Disqualification by Association will only apply on domestic premises, most likely childminders. However, Disqualification under the Childcare Act 2006, still applies to staff themselves.

Schools and early years settings must no longer ask about the cautions or convictions of someone living or working in their household. Schools will need to review any historic data collected and destroy any information which is no longer required. However, this does not mean that as an employer you cannot continue to foster a safe culture whereby it is the expectation that staff inform the setting where their own relationships and associations, both within and outside of the workplace (including online), may have implications for the safeguarding of children in the school. The <u>safer working practices guidance (2019)</u> will assist you with this.

## Staff Safeguarding Training Pack for DSLs in Early Years Settings available

Following the successful launch of our training pack for DSLs in schools to use to deliver staff training, we received a number of enquiries from



DSLs in Early Years settings with requests to produce a similar resource for them.

This resource pack, including a PowerPoint presentation and guidance document is now available to purchase on <u>the Education People</u> website. Please be aware that this pack is for use by EYDSLs within their own setting only. Currently the resources are in line with EYFS 2017 and KCSIE 2020, however they will be updated over the summer to reflect EYFS 2021 content.

#### Childminder Training Pilot

#### Bespoke Safeguarding Staff Training Requests

The team will continue to offer bespoke inset and twilight whole school training, early years basic awareness and staff online safety training, subject to capacity. #### Online Safety

## Reminder: UKCIS 'Sharing nudes and semi-nudes: advice for education settings working with children and young people'

Over the past few weeks, the online safety team have received a number of calls from primary schools relating to children taking or sharing nude or semi-nude images of either themselves or their peers. In many of these cases, schools were not aware of the national UKCIS 'Sharing nudes and semi-nudes' guidance or thought that it was not relevant for primary schools.



The guidance is a practical document which will support DSLs respond effectively to incidents involving the sharing of nude and semi-nude images by children of <u>all</u> ages, not just teenagers. We therefore recommend that DSLs from all education settings access this guidance to ensure they are familiar with the content.

## New ESS Online Safety Products: Social Media Toolkit and Online Safety DSL Training Pack

As part of our <u>Safeguarding Support Package for Schools</u>, we have added two additional online safety resources which schools and settings can purchase. Access to both of these resources is included for package members, however, we have also made these resources available for schools and settings to purchase on an ad hoc basis.

The Whole School Online Safety Training Pack for DSLs has been developed following requests from schools for specific online safety training resources for DSLs to use. Much like our Whole School DSL pack, this resource includes a PowerPoint presentation template for DSLs to adapt and a supporting guidance document specific to online safety. Currently the pack is based on the KCSIE 2020 but will be updated once KCSIE 2021 is available.





The Official Use of Social Media Toolkit for Educational Settings has been updated and developed to help educational setting leaders make informed choices about using social media. The updated toolkit includes considerations about safe practice, specific guidance regarding some popular social media channels and editable tools and templates.

#### <u>Updated 'Appropriate Filtering and Monitoring Definitions' for 2021</u>

The <u>UK Safer Internet Centre (UKSIC)</u> has published updated 'appropriate' filtering and monitoring definitions for 2021



following a public consultation. The definitions should help education leaders understand what is considered 'appropriate'. The revised definitions include:

- 2021 Appropriate Filtering definitions
  - The availability of, or extent to which, content is contextually filtered
  - The availability of, or extent to which, remote devices (i.e. at home) are able to receive school based filtering
- 2021 Appropriate Monitoring definitions
  - Expansion on the presentation of any Internet logfile information
  - Clarity as to the physical location of monitoring data
  - The capability of, or extent to which, remote devices (i.e. at home) are monitored by technology monitoring services
  - The inclusion of, or extent to which, visual content is monitored and analysed by technology monitoring services

#### New Online Safety Resources

#### 'Report Remove' Tool Now Live

In the first three months of this year, the <u>IWF</u> has seen reports of self-generated images more than double compared with the same period last year, increasing from 17,500 to 38,000. Many children have contacted <u>Childline</u> with concerns about self-generated imagery, and the worry they experience once this has been shared.



To help combat this issue, the IWF and Childline have launched 'Report Remove' - a unique, free tool which enables children to report nude or sexual images and videos of themselves that might have been shared, to see if they can be removed from the internet.

Young people are supported by Childline throughout the process, which includes proving their age using <u>Yoti</u> if they are 13-17. Children can expect the same level of confidentiality that they would from all their interactions with Childline. Once a report is submitted, the IWF expert analysts assess the content and if determined to be illegal, work to have it removed in accordance with UK Law. We encourage DSLs to share this resource for their community as appropriate.

#### **UKCIS: Digital Passport**

The UKCIS <u>Vulnerable Users Working Group (VUWG)</u> have launched a new resource for care experienced children and young people and their carers. Talking regularly about their digital life with a trusted adult is an essential way to help keep children safe online and this is particularly important for those who have had adverse childhood experiences.



The <u>UKCIS Digital Passport</u> provides structure and resources to support conversations for both children and carers and includes sections for children to express their feelings, hopes and interests, and content for foster carers and other professionals. An online hub is available on the <u>Internet Matters website</u> with various formats to help ensure it is as accessible as possible.

#### New Digiduck Activity Menu for Educators

Childnet have launched a brand-new menu of <u>free follow up</u> <u>activities as part of their hugely popular Digiduck Collection</u>. The Digiduck® collection, currently contains three books, for children aged 3-7, which cover themes such as friendship, responsibility, and critical thinking in a sensitive and ageappropriate way.



To help complement the books, an extensive menu of free follow up activities has been created and can be found on the <u>Digiduck resource page</u>. There are over 20 activities to choose from, depending on the time and resources available

#### 'CyberSprinters' Games and Activities

'CyberSprinters' is a new online game to help primary schools teach children aged 7 to 11 about cyber security from an early age. It is a free interactive game, designed to make learning about cyber security fun and interactive and has been developed by the National Cyber Security Centre – a part of GCHQ.
