Education Safeguarding Service Survey for DSLs

We would like to invite DSLs to complete a short <u>survey</u> to help us gauge interest and gather opinions regarding possible training and resources we may be able to develop.

We appreciate that your budgets and time are limited, so we are looking to develop resources which are both helpful to schools and settings but also are cost-effective. It's not necessary to provide answers for all of the survey questions,

Keeping Children Safe in Education 2021

As you will have seen in the updated child protection policy templates available on our website, the recent updated version of KSCIE 2021 is now in place and features some changes which should be embedded in your whole setting approach and in your training.

Areas of notable interest are the addition of low-level concerns under the allegations section that staff need to be aware (see below). Also, two new safeguarding priorities have been added. Child abduction and Cybercrime detail issues that have been identified as a particular concern with the children you may work with.

As discussed in previous newsletters there is an increased focus on peer-on-peer sexual abuse in school settings. This follows the <u>Ofsted report</u> from June of this year. There has also been a very good <u>BBC Panorama documentary</u> that aired on 6th September which is a good representation of the issues for all schools.

Covid-19: Anti-vaccine protests

As you are aware new guidance has been published detailing the expectations on schools regarding how they manage further infections should they occur with pupils at their settings. The impact on the emotional wellbeing and welfare of children continues to be felt throughout the sector. It is likely that throughout the next 12 months there will be ongoing challenges because of the pandemic in addition to whatever new guidance the government publishes on related safeguarding issues. As always, if you have concerns about children from your setting, please contact your <u>Area</u> <u>Safeguarding Advisor</u> for support regarding the next steps.

Now a decision has been made on vaccinating 12–16-year-olds this may raise issues about consent and overriding parents' wishes if a child wants to be vaccinated. This can be difficult if parents cannot agree between themselves either.

In parts of Kent, we have seen anti-vaccine protests seemingly targeting secondary schools. We have our two Prevent Education Officers Sally Green and Jill Allen who have told us that as part of their role to support Fundamental British Values, can offer support (resources, briefings, and training) with issues that often surround the anti-science / conspiracy theorist movements. They have lots of ideas and guidance on how to deal with conspiracy theories in the classroom which they are happy to share with you.

You might like to consider having links to sites such as <u>Full Fact</u>, on the relevant page of your school website or alternatively sharing the page link on school social media or other comms to help families / young people have a starting point to navigate the misinformation and propaganda around the issue as well as potentially alleviate any worries they have connected to the leafleting and viral social media posts.

LADO Service

The best way to access up to date information about LADO and the advice being given is via the <u>KSCMP website</u>. Due to the changes in KSCIE 2021 the 'Managing Allegations Guidance' is currently being reviewed/updated. KCSIE advises education to develop a low-level concerns policy and to keep a record of concerns. The LADO service advocates for education settings to continue to have a culture in which all concerns about adults are shared responsibly and with the right person, recorded and dealt with appropriately.

It is advised that the evaluation of 'low level concerns' can be shared with the LADO Enquiries Officer to support you in decision making. This permits concerns to be evaluated objectively and to ascertain whether similar concerns may have been raised by a previous employer or if a pattern is developing.

Mankind Initiative Pattern Changing Programme for male survivors of domestic abuse

The Kent Police and Crime Commissioner has agreed to fund a Pattern Changing Programme for Male Survivors of Domestic Abuse. The online course is 9 weeks long and these are designed for men that are no longer in the abusive relationship, working with them to recognise abuse, make sense of their experiences, help them

understand the impact of domestic abuse on their children, and to move towards healthy and respectful relationships in the future.

Salus Intensive Mentoring Service

Who is it for? Salus can now offer Intensive Mentoring to children and young people aged 10 - 16yrs across the whole of Kent. The service is fully funded by Headstart and Kent Reconnect until the end of 2021.

What is the aim? The aim of the programme is to improve the emotional health, wellbeing and resilience of children and young people.

It will be particularly helpful to those not accessing specialist services but experiencing increased anxiety, poor mental health or social isolation as a result of the pandemic

What will we offer? Salus adopts a strengths-based approach to supporting children, young people, and their families. Using a range of evidence-based approaches and tools (such as the FRIENDS resilience programme) and through the development of a trusted relationship with a talented mentor, we work to understand individual needs and implement an action plan to address these with the young person and their family following assessment of need, the mentor will offer approximately 6-8 weeks of direct support.

How can you refer? It is intended that each young person will have been given the opportunity to have a resilience conversation and complete a resilience self-reflection assessment prior to referral but, if it is not possible, we can do this for you.

Early Years and Childcare

<u>Updated Inspecting safeguarding in early years, education and skills</u> (Ofsted, September 2021)

Ofsted has published an updated version of <u>'Inspecting safeguarding in</u> <u>early years, education and skills'</u> to be read alongside the Education Inspection Framework. The document is only published as a webpage and not in a formatted pdf.



The idea is that this guidance should complement the latest KSCIE 2021. There is a new section added to the inspection guidance about the outcomes from Ofsted's review of sexual abuse between peers in schools and there are further references throughout the guidance outlining expectations of providers.

As with the other guidance around harmful sexual behaviour and peer on peer sexual abuse 'even when leaders do not have specific information that indicates sexual harassment and online sexual abuse are problems for their children, they should act on the assumption that they are'. As with schools, early years settings need to be aware of when appropriate sexualised behaviour becomes problematic for children ensuring they support the alleged instigator as well as the victim.

Early years settings should also be aware of the allegations against staff changes especially regarding low level concerns and how to respond to them.

Safeguarding Package for Schools

Our <u>'Safeguarding Support Package for Schools'</u> is now available for schools! We believe this offer provides DSLs and school leaders with cost effective benefits and support and includes exclusive access to content from our service. We have already received some very positive feedback from schools who have been making use of the resources over the summer.

KCSIE 2021: Online Safety Considerations

As a result of the Covid-19 pandemic, there has been wide-scale increased use of technology as a tool for learning, socialising and play; online safety must be recognised as a key safeguarding consideration.

The update to KCSIE 2021 strengthens the approaches that DSLs and leaders are required to implement to ensure they are able to protect their communities online; we encourage DSLs and leaders to read KCSIE 2021 in full, however the <u>Education</u> <u>Safeguarding Service</u> have created a <u>summary document and blog post</u> which explores the requirements in more depth.

From the 1st September 2021, DSLs should ensure:

- Online safety is established as part of statutory safeguarding responsibilities and there is a whole school/college approach.
- The DSL is clearly recognised as having overall responsibility for online safety; they work with other staff as required and access appropriate training and support to keep them up to date.
- The breadth of online safety issues as identified in KCSIE 2021 are addressed; this has been updated to be content, contact, conduct and commerce.
- Policies are in place which cover online peer on peer abuse and the use of mobile and smart technology. This could be within your existing child protection, and associated safeguarding policies, or as part of a standalone online safety policy.
- The staff behaviour policy addresses acceptable use of technologies, including the use of mobile devices, staff/pupil relationships and communications, including the use of social media.
- There are a range of opportunities within your curriculum for children to be taught about online safety in a way that is appropriate to their age, vulnerability and needs.
- All staff are provided with appropriate and up-to-date online safety training at induction, and as part of regular child protection training and updates.
- All staff are aware of the policies and procedures to follow with regards to responding to online safety concerns, including online peer on peer abuse issues.
- There is regular parental engagement regarding online safety, and specific concerns involving your community are responded to in line with child protection policies.
- Appropriate filtering and monitoring approaches are place, which are relevant for your specific context and technology use.
- Where required, remote learning is implemented in a safe and secure way.
- You undertake an annual review of online safety approaches which is supported by risk assessments which consider and reflect the specific risks your pupils face.

Responding to Online Challenges, Hoaxes and Digital Ghost Stories: A Video Guide for Professionals

Over the last few years, both the Online Safety team within the Education Safeguarding Service and the UKSIC's <u>Professionals Online Safety</u> <u>Helpline</u> (POSH) have seen their fair share of online scares, hoaxes, challenges and 'digital ghost stories'.



Fuelled by sensationalist headlines and misinformation on social media, this content can quickly escalate into a moral panic, with schools and settings, as well as other professionals and parents, fearing for the safety of children. This often begins with usually well-intended individuals sharing concern about a perceived online threat (substantiated or otherwise), which grows to create wide-scale panic and exacerbates the initial harm or indeed, creates harm where none existed to begin with. It's easy to get caught up in sharing such stories because we care, however, even sharing with good intentions can backfire, leading more people to search out and look for the content or story.

In addition to the <u>DfE guidance</u>, the UK Safer Internet Centre has now created <u>a useful</u> <u>video</u> to help us all consider the best steps to take if a 'new' online challenge arises. How we as professional organisations working with children is a vital part of managing and escalating the risk; we encourage DSLs to watch the video and share it with staff (especially senior leaders) to help ensure your community is prepared. DSLs can also contact the Education Safeguarding Service for specialist advice if they have a concern about an online challenge.

With just six months to go until Safer Internet Day, it's a great opportunity to start planning what you can do to celebrate the day in your school or setting. Parent Zone: Back-to-school resources

<u>ParentZone</u> are bringing together all their free resources to help provide inspiration for the <u>new school year</u>. From resources to use in the classroom to events to engage parents, there's something for every educational and professional setting. This includes:



- Be Internet Legends online safety programme for children aged 7-11 years old
- Ollee a virtual friend for children aged 8-11 and their parents
- Digiworld internet safety curriculum and game for children aged 5-16
- VoiceBox an international content platform for 14–25-year-olds, written by young people for young people

Google and ParentZone are also providing national assemblies for children aged 7 to 11, which are designed to bring school communities together across the UK and remind children of the tips and tricks they need to be safe and more confident online. Each 45-minute assembly is a live virtual learning experience designed to consolidate messages from the Be Internet Legends programme. Parents and carers can also be invited to watch from home too. Live assemblies are available monthly for schools from September to December 2021: you can find out more and register for a live event <u>here.</u>

As well as sessions for children, Google and Parent Zone are offering CPD-accredited virtual teacher workshops until the end of October 2021. These workshops are designed to help schools meet online safety challenges and explores the Be Internet Legends programme and how the resources can support a school community. A longer read: Incels and the manosphere

All of you will have received input and training in regard to Prevent and will be familiar with Islamic and right-wing radicalisation. What you may not be fully aware of is the growth of a misogynistic ideology fuelled by involuntary celibates, or 'incels'. The Prevent Education Officers, Sally Green and Jill Allen remain our 'go to' guys for in depth information and knowledge about this but in the meantime, we felt we should forward some of their information to you to help familiarise yourselves with what is a growing issue amongst certain groups of young men.

The ideology is largely online in the so-called 'manosphere,' which is a decentralised network of websites, gaming platforms, and chatrooms imbued with a heavy sense of misogyny and male entitlement to relationships with women which they perceive is thwarted by society, and in particular women. There is significant overlap to other violent ideologies, including but not limited to, right-wing extremism and white supremacy. Sadly, whilst much is online, a few high-profile violent acts in the USA and now the UK (Plymouth attacks) have taken place. These individuals are likely to be seen as martyrs or heroes for the incel movement and admired in the various forums and chat rooms.

Sally Green has provided some key messages for us regarding this new domestic terrorism threat:

- Incels are part of a large, sprawling, and ever-changing network: the manosphere.
- Incels pose a risk to themselves, to women and girls, and to gender relations.
- Certain words and phrases are typical of manosphere, including incel language: 'femoid/foid', 'roastie', 'hit the wall', 'looksmaxx', 'cuck', 'simp', 'AWALT', 'LDAR'.
- Apart from words, members of the manosphere
 - o compare men against women in absolute and emphasised ways
 - often draw on genetics and evolutionary psychology to do so
 - o believe that society has been hijacked by feminists and is biased against men
 - see women as duplicitous and having the power to hurt men, but also as sexual objects.

Please note that showing an active interest in the world of incels/the manosphere is a Prevent issue. Follow normal CP and Prevent referral procedures for your school and area for matters relating to incels. Prevent support can be found at:

All safeguarding training and Prevent training will be updated in due course to reflect these new developments. In the meantime, the message for schools is to focus very strongly on the issues of equality and inclusion with their pupils. The root of incel culture focuses on a misogynistic view of women and girls, some of these attitudes may start when young at school but also be legitimised in later years by certain sections of society and even some parents.
