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Education Safeguarding Service (ESS) Updates

Service Re-design

Following the Education Safeguarding Service returning to Kent County Council in April 2023, we have been undergoing a period of evaluation to explore best practice and value for money. Following this piece of work, a decision has been made to merge our team with the County Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO) Service. The two services have always been closely aligned and it is a natural fit for education settings in terms of streamlining the response we can give. Therefore, as of 1st September there will be a new service known as the LADO and Education Safeguarding Advisory Service.

We will continue to offer many of the services we have before and will have more capacity to provide bespoke consultation work for schools and settings, and to complete more safeguarding reviews where needed. Our Child Protection newsletter will continue to be produced 6 times a year and emailed to all DSLs on our mailing list. DSL catch up meetings will also continue to happen in the next academic year, with one more due to take place in each area before the end of term. Our core DSL training programme will also continue and is detailed later in this newsletter.

Advice and Support Line

The biggest change that will happen as of September 2024, is that schools and early years settings will no longer be able to access our advice and support lines for safeguarding advice. We are replacing the line with a joint ESS LADO portal; further details will be made available as soon as possible. Education settings can continue to request a consultation from the Front Door if required.

As an interim arrangement once school holidays have begun on 25th July, schools and settings will need to email the education safeguarding inbox if they have a non-urgent enquiry unrelated to individual children and an advisor will respond when available. **Please note, this relates ONLY to non-urgent, non-child related queries.**

Schools and setting are encouraged to follow existing guidance set out in KCSIE and supporting documents on KSCMP and KELSI to help decide next steps. The process of support and guidance from ESS remains a fluid situation which will be monitored and continually reviewed as we seek to find the best way to support our education partners.

ESS Policy Updates and Safeguarding Support Package

Child Protection Policy Templates 2024-25

Our School/College and Early Years Child Protection Policy Templates for 2024-25 have been published on The Education People website: <u>Template Policies and Guidance</u>

The ongoing restructure, however, means that some processes will not be confirmed until the end of 2024. We appreciate that schools and settings like to have the templates available before the summer holiday, so have published an initial draft which can be used in the interim. Schools and settings will need to keep their own policies under regular review and update them as/when further information is available.

Our remaining policy templates are under review and will be updated where appropriate, on our pages on <u>the Education People website</u>, along with our <u>content on KELSI</u> over the summer.

Safeguarding Support Package

Following the service restructure, we have made the decision to temporarily suspend our current Safeguarding Support Package offer. The decision to suspend the package has not been taken lightly and we believe it is important to ensure that our services provide the best value for money. We do understand this news may be disappointing, however we will continue to make the most popular resources available to purchase as standalone products via the Education People website in the interim. We will be reviewing our entire catalogue of products and are committed to finding new ways to support schools and settings.

National Safeguarding Updates

Keeping Children Safe in Education 2024

The Department for Education published the 2024 draft version of <u>Keeping Children Safe in Education</u>, which will come into effect on 1st September 2024.



Substantive changes from the 2023 version include:

- Updated definitions and terminology to reflect the updated Working Together 2023
- Increased references to exploitation
- · Clarifying text added regarding gender questioning children, in line with guidance
- Further guidance added regarding the DSLs ensuring they record rationales for making decisions when holding and sharing information.

The NSPCC has published a <u>summary of key changes</u> and the Education Safeguarding Service has produced a <u>document and blog post</u> regarding the specific online safety changes for DSLs and leaders.

CSA Mandatory Reporting

The government has published its <u>response</u> to the consultation regarding the implementation of the mandatory duty to report incidents of child sexual abuse in England. The response highlight's key themes from the consultation feedback, presents proposals for the new duty and outlines the next steps that will be taken.

Some of the key responses include:

- Targeting punishment at those seeking to prevent the duty from being carried out.
- Keeping the scope of the duty to direct disclosures and witnessed incidents of abuse, and not including indicators or suspicions of abuse under the legal duty.
- Committing to a necessary time frame for implementation and to evaluate the impact of the new duty on outcomes for children and relevant settings.

Local Safeguarding updates

Self-harm Prevention Advice for Professionals, Families and Young People

New <u>self-harm prevention and advice for professionals, families and young people</u> has now been published. This guidance reflects the change in practice as outlined in the <u>NICE</u> <u>guidance</u> and is a collaborative effort between partners from across Kent and Medway's health and social care services, voluntary and charity sector, and educational providers.

The guidance is divided into three sections; one for professionals; one for parents, families and carers; and one for children and young people. Each section offers support and advice.

We encourage you to review the guidance and share it with others who may benefit from it.

KSCMP: Introduction to Neglect for Children and Young People Training

KSCMP are running a course to build awareness and understanding of neglect and to explore approaches and next steps to better safeguard children and young people (CYP). The training will enable delegates to safeguard children and young people by early identification of neglect by reducing the impacts of neglect through early help approaches and the number of repeat cases of neglect for individual children and young people.

The learning outcomes are to:

- Recognise signs and symptoms of neglect drawing out the differences for children and adolescents
- Understand the definition and impacts of neglect and concept of cumulative harm
- Explore how we respond to neglect including early help and strength-based approaches
- Emphasise the importance and challenges of listening to CYP who are experiencing neglect
- Share learning from relevant Child Safeguarding Practice Reviews.

EasyPeasy: Free parenting app available for parents of young children in Kent



As part of their commitment to supporting local families and parents in the early stages of their child's development, Kent Family Hubs has commissioned the EasyPeasy app, which has now been launched to support parents, carers, and early years practitioners of babies and children aged zero to five-year-olds across the area and transform everyday parenting moments into playful learning activities.

EasyPeasy brings together ideas, advice, and inspiration from a diverse community of parents, experts, and brands, supporting families and their zero to five-year-olds during the crucial early years. Parents can access thousands of simple, fun, and educational parenting tips and activities, tailored to their child's age and development stage, designed to use everyday materials that families already have access to at home.

The app includes information, activities, and tips on a range of topics including:

- wellbeing
- bedtime
- nutrition
- speech and language
- mindfulness.



The EasyPeasy app also allows parents and carers to create and share their own parenting tips and experiences, building peer-to-peer support systems in local communities.

Early Years and Childcare

Emotional Support in Early Childhood



The Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) has created a valuable resource intended to assist in fostering self-regulation and cognitive processes during early childhood. The recommended approaches for early years educators to support children in managing their thoughts, actions, and emotional responses, include:

- creating and navigating challenges
- teaching self-monitoring and self-awareness
- establishing a community of collaborative learners
- promoting physical activity

Early Words Matter

Young children need to develop crucial communication skills needed to share their voice and talk about any worries. The National Literacy Trust recognises the impact of a child's home environment on their communication and language development, so, they have developed a programme called 'Early Words Together' which focuses on supporting parents and raising awareness of the importance of providing a language-rich environment.

Online Safety

Connect: New Teaching Resources from CEOP Education

CEOP Education have produced a new teaching resource to empower children aged 9-12 to develop online independence and help protect them from on and offline abuse by exploring the principles of healthy relationships.



The set of four lesson plans and five short situational films cover the following topics:

- Healthy, respectful relationships
- Safer socialising online
- Healthy and respectful online relationship behaviours
- Responding to harmful online behaviour, including grooming, and when and how to seek help

<u>Connect</u> has been awarded the <u>PSHE Association</u> Quality Mark and includes alternative and extension activities to support children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and/or additional needs.

Online Safety Training Sessions from UK Safer Internet Centre

In September, the <u>UK Safer Internet Centre</u> will be hosting their Online Safety Live events virtually; these sessions are aimed at professionals who work directly with children, and will explore the latest research, guidance and resources available from the UK Safer Internet Centre and their partners.

Think Before You Share: Campaign from the Internet Watch Foundation

THINK BEFORE YOU SHARE

<u>'Think before you share'</u> is a nationwide campaign from the <u>Internet Watch Foundation</u>, aiming to encourage parents and carers to talk with their children about sharing nudes and sexually explicit images, both with each other and online. This campaign follows reports from the IWF of a significant increase in so-called '<u>self-generated child sexual abuse' material</u>, as well as a recent warning from the National Crime Agency regarding an increasing number of children being targeted/ victims of <u>financially motivated sexual exploitation (sextortion)</u>.

As a reminder, the <u>guidance for education settings on responding to incidents of sharing nudes</u> and <u>semi-nudes</u> was updated (March 2024) to include further guidance around Al-generated images and 'sextortion'. DSLs should be referring to this guidance if they have concerns about children sharing nude or sexually explicit content.

Report Remove is a service run by the IWF and Childline which enables young people (under 18) to confidentially report sexual images and videos of themselves and remove them from the internet.





Take It Down from the National Centre for Missing and Exploited Take It Down Children allows young people to report and prevent their nude or sexual images (taken before they were 18 years old) from being uploaded online.

NEW Resources from the NSPCC

Techosaurus is a new character from the NSPCC which aims to help parents and carers have positive conversations about online safety with young children.



The Techosaurus Activity Pack helps to make conversations with young children, about staying safe online, as easy as possible for parents and carers, with a colouring in activity, dotto-dot and maze game. Each pack includes:

- Four Techosaurus activities designed to teach about online safety.
- An Online Safety Family agreement to complete together
- A digital certificate to celebrate completion of the training
- A parents guide to the activities, and how to talk about staying safe online

For parents of older children, who may be getting their first phone or a new device, the NSPCC have teamed up with Vodaphone to produce their Trust: phone safety toolkit. By exploring the different the sections of the acronym T.R.U.S.T, it aims to empower parents and carers to have meaningful conversations with their child and develop trust together, through a variety of activities and conversation starters.



Using the discussions and lessons they've learned through the toolkit, they can create a digital family pledge, to agree rules and boundaries together for safe and acceptable use of their new phone.

What Is Undress AI? Guidance for Parents and Carers



As artificial intelligence continues to increase in capability and popularity, so do the concerns around its potential misuse and the possible implications for children and young people. Undress AI describes the latest online tools that uses artificial intelligence to remove clothes of individuals in images. Read more from Internet Matters about the technology, the law, and how we can support children to be safer online.

NEW- Snapchat Safety Features



Snapchat have announced new safety features, designed to protect users from online harms and unwanted communications from people they don't know. Their new suite of tools includes expanded in-app warnings, enhanced friending protections, simplified locationsharing, and improved blocking capabilities – all designed to help ensure that Snapchat users can only be messaged by individuals they have added as friends or have added to their phone contacts

National Research, Events and Resources

NSPCC Learning

NSPCC Learning has released a podcast delving into how the unique language and communication requirements of d/Deaf children impact their safety and the child protection assistance they access. The podcast includes a conversation with a group of specialists from the Social Workers with Deaf Children and Professionals Working Group, discussing various topics such as assisting a d/Deaf child in reporting abuse, obstacles in recognising safeguarding issues, and the importance of not making assumptions about the preferred communication methods of d/Deaf children and young people.



Also, the summer holidays will soon be upon us, and it's important to re-visit the issue of parents looving children at leave. signpost parents and carers to the advice from the NSPCC for more information.

Supporting Mental Health in Educational Settings

Child of the North and the Centre for Young Lives have released a report detailing a strategy to bolster children's mental health within education settings in England. The report examines the potential impact of education settings on child mental health and urges the government to broaden mental health assistance within educational environments.



The recommendations encompass enhanced support for preschool children with neurodiverse conditions, implementing school-based surveys to collect local data on children's mental wellbeing and addressing workforce challenges in educational psychology services.

Education, Children and Violence



A new practical guidance report from the Youth Endowment Fund (YEF) focuses on implementing effective strategies in schools, colleges, and alternative provision (AP) to prevent children from getting involved in violence.

The YEF consulted a group of school, college and AP leaders, academics, and policy experts to provide practical guidance based on their expertise. Its recommendations to protect children from violence include:

- keeping children in education
- providing trusted adults and creating trusted relationships
- developing children's social and emotional skills

Requesting a Consultation with the Front Door Service

Following changes to our dedicated advice and support line, we are working with our colleagues in the Quality Assurance unit and Front Door Service to review the consultation process for all agencies.

The current expectations regarding consultations with the Front Door Service, as outlined in their processes, is as follows.

Purpose of a consultation

The purpose of a consultation with the Front Door is to provide advice on the best action to take when working with a child and their family. A consultation should not be sought when you are clear that a Request for Support is appropriate (in line with the Kent Support Level Guidance) or has already been made through the portal.

Responsibilities

The consultee will be expected to seek advice from their own DSL before contacting the Front Door.

The consultee will be expected to have a discussion with the parent/carer or young person about their concerns before contacting the Front Door for a consultation. This discussion may lead to a better understanding of the concerns and enable identification of suitable support for the child, young person or family without the need for seeking a consultation.

When seeking a consultation, it will be helpful to share the identity of the child with the Front Door Social Worker. This will allow them to check systems held by Children's Social Work Services and Early Help to ensure that the most appropriate advice is provided. No information will be shared with the consultee about the history of the child, but if the child or a sibling is receiving support from either Children's Social Work Services or Early Help, the consultee will be provided with details of the allocated worker so direct contact can be made. The Front Door will not record any details of the consultation; this is the responsibility of the professional

seeking the consultation. However, if the concerns being raised are of a safeguarding nature, this will be recorded on the Children's Services system to ensure immediate appropriate action is taken. Under these circumstances, the professional will be required to subsequently submit their concerns via the portal.

Next Steps

Please ensure you regularly review your settings child protection policies to ensure they reflect any changes to local Kent processes.

We know there is a high level of skill and knowledge among DSL teams all over Kent, and you should be empowered to apply this understanding and experience to your decision making. We would like to take this opportunity to reassure schools and settings that we are committed to continuing the positive working relationship we have with you all. We will be spending time over the summer and into the autumn and winter terms looking for different ways this can be achieved and to ensure we can support you in implementing effective safeguarding practice in your settings.
