
LADO Education Safeguarding Advisory Service (LESAS) Updates

Local Safeguarding updates

Front Door 'No Named' Consultations



From February 2025, the Front Door service will be offering 'no named consultations' to provide advice when you believe that a child or children may be in need of support from integrated children's services, but you are not clear whether to submit a Request for Support.

Your call will initially be taken by a member of the contact centre team (03000 411111) where a brief summary of the reason for your call will be taken and passed on to an experienced social worker. No child details will be shared and therefore you do not require consent from the parent or carer.

These consultations will then allow the consultee to decide upon the most appropriate course of action, following the advice given. Following the consultation, you will receive an email with a unique number for your records to confirm the FDS have provided a No Named Consultation.

Water Safety

How often do children in your setting engage in water play activities? There are many educational benefits for children when learning and exploring with water, so it is important that as professionals we also consider any potential safety risks alongside this.

We also have a duty to share our knowledge of how to keep children safe with our families. Unfortunately, research published by the Royal Life Saving Society UK reports that children under the age of five are most at risk of drowning. The statistics tell us that one child a month drowns at home in England.



So, a new campaign, <u>Splash Safety at Your Pad</u> has been designed to help children and families enjoy water play safely at home. Check out the variety of resources that can be shared.

Looking after our workforce in the Early Years

It is important to recognise the stress and demands that come with working in an early years setting. By recognising this, it means that we can draw attention to providing and targeting the support and encouragement our staff team need. A setting which prioritizes staff well-being will be a happier and safer place for all.

Research by Anna Freud National Centre has helped developed <u>resources</u> and tips on how to create a supporting, working environment and embed this into everyday practice. These four key components were highlighted to help improve mental health for staff:

- Physical environment

NEW! Test Filtering +

Schools must have appropriate filtering and monitoring systems in place and regularly review their effectiveness; <u>testfiltering.com</u> is a free tool we often recommend from SWGfL, which allows DSLs and schools leaders to periodically check their filtering system is blocking the <u>minimum required standards</u>.

SWGfL have recently launched an extension to this platform called <u>Test Filtering+</u>, a proactive system which will continuously monitor your school devices and provide you with alerts and reports if/when there are issues, ensuring that your filtering system is effectively safeguarding against illegal and harmful material. There is an annual charge for this service (based on the number of devices connected to your network) and it does not replace your <u>school's monitoring</u> approaches.

A Longer Read:

Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill

The Term 2 Newsletter referred to the DfE policy statement, 'Keeping Children Safe, Helping Families Thrive.' The 'Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill' has subsequently begun its journey through Parliament. Part 1 of the bill contains reforms to children's social care. Part 2 makes provision relating to education in England. Overall, the bill makes explicit the role of schools and education settings in safeguarding children and young people in a number of ways:

Safeguarding partners

The bill seeks to amend the Children Act 2004 to make it a requirement for the three statutory safeguarding partners (the local authority, NHS integrated care board and Police) in each local area to include education and childcare "relevant agencies" as mandatory participants in their multi-agency safeguarding arrangements. Currently, safeguarding partners only need to make arrangements to work with a "relevant agency" if they consider it appropriate to do so. This aim helps to ensure the voice of education is heard and considered.

Multi-agency child protection teams

The bill would insert new sections into the Children Act 2004 to require safeguarding partners to establish and run at least one multi-agency child protection team in their area. The main purpose of these new teams is to support the local authority in delivering its child protection duties under section 47 of the Children Act 1989.

NHS Integrated Care Bards ('ICBs') will be required to nominate a health professional with experience in relation to children's health, while the police will be required to nominate an officer to be part of each multi-agency child protection team. The local authority is required to nominate someone with experience in education in relation to children and a social worker with experience in relation to children and may appoint other appropriate individuals after consultation with safeguarding partners.

Information sharing

The bill would also amend the Children Act 2004 to impose a duty on specified persons and bodies to disclose information that may be relevant to safeguarding or promoting the welfare of a child, to other relevant persons in certain circumstances. The duty applies where the person considers that the disclosure may facilitate the exercise by the recipient of any of its functions that relate to safeguarding or promoting the welfare of children, unless disclosure would be detrimental to the child.

The duty to share information will apply to persons listed in section 11(1) of the Children Act 2004, including local authorities, ICBs, NHS trusts/foundation trusts, police forces, probation services and youth offending teams, along with education and childcare "relevant agencies".

Consistent child identifier

The bill also makes provision, under the Children Act 2004, for a consistent child identifier (also known as a single unique identifier or SUI). Designated persons must include the consistent identifier when processing information about a child for safeguarding and promotion of welfare purposes. The idea is that a consistent identifier will allow those responsible for the safeguarding and welfare of children to better join relevant data and identify children who will benefit from additional support.

Supporting educational achievement

Under amendments to the Children Act 1989, local authorities would be required to take appropriate measures to support the educational outcomes of children in need, previously looked after children and children in kinship care.

The steps that can be taken under this duty include enabling children to overcome barriers to their educational achievement and improving educational attendance. The duty is a strategic duty, which does not extend to the educational outcomes of individual childrenThe local authority must appoint at least one person to discharge the duty (in practice this is usually the virtual school head).

Children not in school


The bill proposes a number of reforms aimed at protecting children who are being educated at home. Most of these involve amendments to the Education Act 1996 and include:

- Compulsory registers of children not in school in each local authority area in England, and a duty on local authorities to support the children on their registers (should a parent request this).
- Changes to the school attendance order (SAO) legal framework, for example, by introducing statutory timeframes for issuing and processing SAOs and making it an offence for parents to withdraw a child subject to an SAO from school without following the proper procedure.
- A requirement for a parent to obtain local authority consent to home educate if a child is: (1) subject to an enquiry under section 47 of the Children Act 1989, (2) on a child protection plan, or (3) at a special school or academy.
- A power for the local authority, in cases where a child is subject to a section 47
 Children Act 1989 enquiry or on a child protection plan and is already being home educated, to review whether it is in the best interests of the child to be in school and require that the child be registered at a school.
- A duty for local authorities to consider the home environment and other learning environments when determining whether or not children should be required to attend school.

The bill covers a number of other areas of relevance to schools, apart from safeguarding (eg limitations on branded uniform items, increased access to free breakfast clubs for primary school children, new powers for Ofsted to regulate 'parent undertakings' e.g., trusts).

The bill will be subject to debate in Parliament and will no doubt be amended during its passage. It is likely to become law sometime in spring 2025, although not all its provisions will be enacted immediately, with some coming into effect over the next 2 years.
